My dear one Mrs.

I didn't write to you yesterday
so just scribbled you a post card this
morning. I have just got in a load a
good wash & changed into dry clothes
& got two good long letters from you
of the 13-14, enclosing Blanche's letters.
Awfully nice letters are they. I think the
last one I set you was the nicest of
all. No I never got a letter saying she
had asked for a photo of me. In one letter
you said what photo shall I send her or
something like that & it rather puzzled me.
Send her the one in uniform. It is awfully
nice of her wanting it. Do you think
she likes me? I wonder!
I wrote her boys the other day telling
her all the news. I do wish Frankie would
out here. He's not his job. Laurie is a

regular soldier & of course his job to
be out but it must be dreadful for
the having both boys out. Frank I think
is standing at the best of the two.

Whenever I see them or get news of them I
always let the Doctor know as quickly
as possible as its non difficult for them
to write them it is for me. I don't think
either of them on my good at letter writing.

I'm very fond of B. so its no trouble to
write & I like having good news for her.

I don't think I have told you much news
since the 16th so I'll tell you all my
doings with them.

16. We had a late breakfast. The 9th were
in a par next to our cottee & several
of them came in & had a wash & cleaned
up. They'd had a pretty bad time in
the trenches. The weather had been rather
bitingly cold & raining. There was a lot
of water in the trenches, so they had
a pretty rotten time. They were very glad.

About 11 o'clock I went out for a ride. It was
windy & sunny so I managed to take a
few photos. It came on to rain hard about
12 o'clock so I got rather wet. I got in
again about 1 o'clock & had lunch. Then
I, Barbara & I rode out & took the
gun & looked for porcupines in the woods.
They were awfully wild but after a bit
of manoeuvring Barbara got a brace.
We came in about 4 o'clock. Oh! yes I
wrote to you last night. A good
night if I remember right.

Nov 17. The bad weather a good deal of shelling
in the night, shells still kept coming
close to us but nothing near enough to
do any damage. We heard that we
were coming back here & that the Cavalry
were to be pulled out & put into
Reserve for a bit. Poor devils they
deserve it. They've had a awful hard
time. The I Bde came back last night

The II Bde is still up there but comes
back in a moment. Poor little 'Pie'
Annedey was killed that night by a
sniper, the only man in the Squadron that
killed him. I know now that the
Col is dead but whether its true or not
I can't say. I'm awfully afraid it is.
That's 5 we've had killed if the Col is dead.
Willie Codrington. Pie, Rose, a Terror.
Shannon I know too he was wounded. So
now we have Yeoman, Clem, Gibblet
Mark Falder & Betty Palmer wounded.
Dreadful casualties that it.

That night we came back here & got
in about 7 in. We had a good ride.
The whole road was blocked with
French transport & the sides of the
road was about a foot of mud.
Dreadful it was. It is awfully
nice to be back here. I like this
house, it's more like a English house
than anything we've struck yet.

18. I went for a ride with the J.C. Brown. I saw Tommy Pilmer who is quite alright again. He came & dined with us last night & was in great heart. I rode into the town & set you a photo (r.c.) of it about 2 miles off. Good idea that I went it. I heard that the Russians had been held up a bit near Thom. But its a big job & its only natural that they couldn't walk through it. I do hope they're doing well further south as so much depends on it. I'd give anything for this d-d slow to be over. Its dreadful boozing all our friends like this. In the afternoon I went off to try & find the 2nd Bde & see Brock. The J.C. & Sanders went off to shoot. I met him & — & rode back with him to about 6 miles outside the

been. It's going back to the Regt. I
do wish he wouldn't but it's no good trying
to persuade him. It's decided to go & go
he will. I saw J. V. he's been a bit
soddy with a cold. But he was quite
cheery. I got back here about 5 or 6
got two letters from you, dated Oct 30
& Nov 11th. I missed you as about
writing. I seem to get a letter from
you every day. (They come right when.
Last night's letter was Nov 12.

So it sounds I get them all mixed
up. I'll answer them all now as I
have plenty of time. The only thing is
it's rather cold of her. But I'll go a
bit I'm cold & then go downstairs to
a fire. I can't write when there's a
crowd about, they annoy me & distract
my attention. Yesterday was a
lovely day. It froze in the night
& then we had bright sunshine fully
with all day. Glorious it was.

4. Nov 19. It froze hard last night & was
 very dark & cold this morning. The gun
 I went for a ride & rode down to B -
 where we had a couple of cars to meet us.
 Set our horses back & went off to a
 wood about 8 miles off. Home - The gun
 was in one car & Porter Bagally Allaby's
 A.D.C. took me in his. It started to
 snow on the way & the wind to rise &
 was awfully cold. We had quite fun
 & had about in the woods. We had about
 8 birds. That they were very nice
 pleasant. The gun got a pheasant, a
 rabbit & a hen which was the total bag.
 I had a shot at a pheasant a long way
 off but it sailed away nimbly.
 It started to snow hard about 2 or
 so about 2 or we went back to the
 farm & had some sandwiches & the
 come back. By then it was snowing
 hard & the ground is all white now
 a good bit of snow on the ground.

Dreadful for the poor devils in the
trenches isn't it. It's dreadfully cold.

I've got a Pontist woman in a shell I'm
quite cold of her.

Maun has just come in & says that
we will have to move from here in a
day or two as this area has been given
to the II Corps. A bon isn't it.

But better news still. He says that
there is a rumour that offers on going
to be given 4 days leave & be allowed
to go home. I'm afraid it's too good
to be true so don't bank on it.

If it is true I ought to be able to
get away without any difficulty.

I'll get a wire through to you if
I can manage it & will come straight
to Folkestone. If I get home I must

see Blanche somehow. Do you think
she would be let come & stay. If not
we could visit her on day.

 Its bad enough for the men but would

kill a woman. You've only got to
see some of the Ist Corps & you'd
realize what the Troops are. It's all a
scum. They look more like animals
than anything else. Old, haggard, gaunt
& dirty with weeks & weeks of beard.
The only redeeming feature is that they
have had tons of food. The A.S.C.
really has been wonderful & has done its
job in the most marvellous way.

But the idea of any woman joining the

can tell the good body so from me.

of their guns. You'd only have
to try & get through Ypres & you'd
realise that. Now all transport has
to go round & it means a lot longer
journeys. You see all the roads
converge into Ypres & only small
roads connect the big converging
roads, consequently all the small
roads are blocked with transport etc.
I'll send you a map of this part of
the world so as you can see for
yourself the lie of the country.
