Dear Mr Arundstone-

My thanks for your letter
my husband was so sorry to miss
you this time. But says better luck
next time - he got 4 days leave &
enjoyed his leave very much. & went
back much better - he did not have
a chance to call on Mrs Arundstone in
London we were up for 2 days just
previous to your letter. time went so
quickly; we were always darting off to
look at a house & find it was just
gone, the air raids seem to have sent
such a number of folks this way.

From what I can hear the Division has
done wonders and Rahab was in hopes
of seeing you & shewing you the maps:

But he hopes you will write to him & tell
him your news, he is never tired of hearing
of Pat. they always feel he is still with
them, unless they have a victory, & they have
been doing wonders lately. I met Col & Mrs
Abbott at Charney's. The Colonel was going
by the same train as Robt. they are so
nice, & asked Robt. how you were, also
Jesse. Robt says please dont shut him
out if he does not answer your letters
at once, but he was only getting 24 hours
sleep in 24-20 his brain is in such a
state at times he can do nothing but
go for a drive. I have not got a house,
yet Robt. is true to me. yours very truly
